



Annie Tuck (Boyington)

March 10, 1917 - January 25, 2025

TUCK, Annie (Jean), née BOYINGTON passed away peacefully in her 108th year at St. Joseph's at Fleming Long Term Care Home, Peterborough, on 25 January 2025, in the presence of family.

Annie was the firstborn to Harry and Emma in Back Lane, Beeston Rylands, Nottinghamshire, U.K., on March 10, 1917, survived two World Wars, several global epidemics and three younger brothers (Doug, Ernest and George)! After moving to Winnipeg in 1958 with husband Ted, predeceased, she lived in Toronto for 22 years before spending 38 years in the Cobourg area. Super-Nana has now passed the torch to the next generations: son George (Carina), grandchildren Loughlin (Carolynne), Rose Copland (Paul), Éamonn (Ann) and Patrick (Laura Anne) and great-grandchildren Sinéad, Éva, Rory, Brielle and Éloïse.

Annie was raised where the Beeston Canal joins the River Trent, started work at Boots Drugs upon leaving school and worked as a volunteer painting Wellington bombers at the outset of WW2. She was an avid gardener and spent many hours cultivating vegetables and roses with her father and was also an accomplished seamstress. She volunteered for community causes wherever she saw a need.

Interment of her remains will be with Ted and her family at Beeston Cemetery
